This information pertains to one of the JICA Knowledge Co-Creation Programs (Group & Region Focus) of the Japan International Cooperation Agency (JICA) implemented as part of the Official Development Assistance of the Government of Japan based on bilateral agreement between both Governments.

JICA Knowledge Co-Creation Program (KCCP)

The Japanese Cabinet released the Development Cooperation Charter in June 2023, which stated, "In its development cooperation, Japan has maintained the spirit of jointly creating things that suit partner countries while respecting ownership, intentions and intrinsic characteristics of the country concerned based on a field-oriented approach through dialogue and collaboration. It has also maintained the approach of building reciprocal relationships with developing countries in which both sides learn from each other and grow and develop together." JICA believes that this 'Knowledge Co-Creation Program' will serve as a foundation of mutual learning process.

I. Concept

Background

According to a recent WHO report, there are 41 million deaths annually due to non-communicable diseases (NCDs), which is 74% of all deaths worldwide. Furthermore, 17 million people die from a NCD before 70 mainly in low- and middle-income countries. Cardiovascular diseases account for most NCD deaths, followed by cancers, chronic respiratory diseases and diabetes. The burden of these diseases is rising disproportionately among lower income countries and populations (WHO), and increasing the weight on the control in addition to infectious diseases and maternal and child health issues as double burden.

The 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development has made NCDs a major challenge for sustainable development. Leaders also pledged to take a national response to reduce early deaths from NCDs by one-third through prevention and treatment by 2030.

For what?

The program aims to strengthen community health, including countermeasures for NCDs, in islands and remote areas where human resources and health care facilities are limited and geographically handicapped.

For whom?

This program is offered to Ministry of Health, National/Local hospitals and Health center, especially persons who in charge of countermeasures for NCDs.

How?

Participants shall have opportunities to identify approaches and strategies to ensure program effectiveness, enhance community health, and improve the situation for their organizations.

Topics are including;

- 1) Lifestyle guidance in clinical setting: basic knowledge on NCDs.
- 2) Epidemiology: basic knowledge to understand how to collect useful data and interpret them correctly.
- Community activities including schools: NCD prevention, health promotion, screenings for NCD risk factors and cancers, and dissemination of health-related information.

Participants will formulate an action plan describing how the participant can understand the course contents and apply them to improve the service in your organization using strong and available points and issues in community health for NCDs' countermeasures.

III. Eligibility and Procedures

1. Expectations to the Applying Organizations

- (1) This course is designed primarily for organizations that intend to address specific issues or problems identified in their operation. Applying organizations are expected to use the program for those specific purposes.
- (2) This course is enriched with contents and facilitation schemes specially developed in collaboration with relevant prominent organizations in Japan. These special features enable the course to meet specific requirements of applying organizations and effectively facilitate them toward solutions for the issues and problems.

2. Nominee Qualifications

Applying organizations are expected to select nominees who meet the following qualifications.

(1) Essential Qualifications

- Current Duties: be an administrative official in National/local governments (including a staff in local health center) who in charge of countermeasures for NCDs.
- 2) Experience in the relevant field: have more than 5 years' experience in the field.
- 3) Educational Background: be a graduate of university
- 4) Language: have a competent command of spoken and written English which is equal to TOEFL iBT 100 or more (This workshop includes active participation in discussions, which requires high competence of English ability. Please attach an official certificate for English ability such as TOEFL, TOEIC etc, if possible)
- 5) Health: must be in good health, both physically and mentally, to participate in the Program. To reduce the risk of worsening symptoms associated with respiratory tract infection, please be honest to declare in the Medical History (QUESTIONNAIRE ON MEDICAL STATUS RESTRICTION of the application form) if you have been a patient of following illnesses; Hypertension/ Diabetes/ Cardiovascular illness/ Heart failure/ Chronic respiratory illness.

(2) Recommendable Qualifications

- 1) Expectations for the Participants: Basic PC skill (Word, Excel, Power Point).
- 2) Age: be under fifty (50) years
- 3) Gender Equality and Women's Empowerment: Women are encouraged to apply for the program. JICA is committed to promoting gender equality and women's empowerment, and provides equal opportunities for all applicants regardless of their sexual orientation or gender identity.

3. Required Documents for Application

- (1) Application Form: The Application Form is available at the JICA overseas office (or the Embassy of Japan)
 - * If you have any difficulties/disabilities which require assistance, please specify necessary assistances in the QUESTIONNAIRE ON MEDICAL STATUS RESTRICTION (1-(c)) of the application form. Information will be reviewed and used for reasonable accommodation.
- (2) Photocopy of Passport: You should submit it with the application form if you possess your passport which you will carry when entering Japan for this program. If not, you are requested to submit its photocopy as soon as you obtain it. The following information should be included in the photocopy: Name, Date of Birth, Nationality, Sex, Passport Number and Expiry Date.
- (3) English Score Sheet: to be submitted with the application form, if the nominees have any official English examination scores. (e.g., TOEFL, TOEIC, IELTS)
- (4) Job Report: to be submitted with the application form. Fill in Annex I of this General Information.

4. Procedures for Application and Selection

(1) Submission of the Application Documents

Closing date for applications: Please confirm the local deadline with the JICA overseas office (or the Embassy of Japan).

(All required material must arrive at JICA Center in Japan by September 2, 2024)

(2) Selection

Primary screening is conducted at the JICA overseas office (or the embassy of Japan) after receiving official documents from your government. JICA Center will consult with concerned organizations in Japan in the process of final selection. Applying organizations with the best intentions to utilize the opportunity will be highly valued.

The Government of Japan will examine applicants who belong to the military or other military-related organizations and/or who are enlisted in the military, taking into consideration of their duties, positions in the organization and other relevant information in a comprehensive manner to be consistent with the Development Cooperation Charter of Japan.

(3) Notice of Acceptance

Notification of results will be made by the JICA office (or the Embassy of Japan)

not later than October 1, 2024.

5. Conditions for Participation

The participants of KCCP are required:

- (1) to strictly observe the course schedule;
- (2) not to change the air ticket (and flight class and flight schedule arranged by JICA) and lodging by the participants themselves;
- (3) to understand that leaving Japan during the course period (to return to home country, etc.) is not allowed (except for programs longer than one year);
- (4) not to bring or invite any family members (except for programs longer than one year);
- (5) to carry out such instructions and abide by such conditions as may be stipulated by both the nominating Government and the Japanese Government in respect of the course;
- (6) to observe the rules and regulations of the program implementing partners to provide the program or establishments;
- (7) not to engage in political activities, or any form of employment for profit;
- (8) to discontinue the program, should the participants violate the Japanese laws or JICA's regulations, or the participants commit illegal or immoral conduct, or get critical illness or serious injury and be considered unable to continue the course. The participants shall be responsible for paying any cost for treatment of the said health conditions except for the medical care stipulated in (3) of "5. Expenses", "IV. Administrative Arrangements";
- (9) to return the total amount or a part of the expenditure for the KCCP depending on the severity of such violation, should the participants violate the laws and ordinances;
- (10) not to drive a car or motorbike, regardless of an international driving license possessed;
- (11) to observe the rules and regulations at the place of the participants' accommodation; and
- (12) to refund allowances or other benefits paid by JICA in the case of a change in schedule.

For Your Reference

JICA and Capacity Development

Technical cooperation is people-to-people cooperation that supports partner countries in enhancing their comprehensive capacities to address development challenges by their own efforts. Instead of applying Japanese technology per se to partner countries, JICA's technical cooperation provides solutions that best fit their needs by working with people living there. In the process, consideration is given to factors such as their regional characteristics, historical background, and languages. JICA does not limit its technical cooperation to human resources development; it offers multi-tiered assistance that also involves organizational strengthening, policy formulation, and institution building.

Implementation methods of JICA's technical cooperation can be divided into two approaches. One is overseas cooperation by dispatching experts and volunteers in various development sectors to partner countries; the other is domestic cooperation by inviting participants from developing countries to Japan. The latter method is the Knowledge Co-Creation Program, formerly called Training Program, and it is one of the core programs carried out in Japan. By inviting officials from partner countries and with cooperation from domestic partners, the Knowledge Co-Creation Program provides technical knowledge and practical solutions for development issues in participating countries.

The Knowledge Co-Creation Program (Group & Region Focus) has long occupied an important place in JICA operations. About 400 pre-organized course cover a wide range of professional fields, ranging from education, health, infrastructure, energy, trade and finance, to agriculture, rural development, gender mainstreaming, and environmental protection. A variety of programs is being customized by the different target organizations to address the specific needs, such as policy-making organizations, service provision organizations, as well as research and academic institutions. Some programs are organized to target a certain group of countries with similar developmental challenges.

Japanese Development Experience

Japan, as the first non-Western nation to become a developed country, built itself into a country that is free, peaceful, prosperous and democratic while preserving its tradition. Japan will serve as one of the best examples for our partner countries to follow in their own development.

From engineering technology to production management methods, most of the know-how that has enabled Japan to become what it is today has emanated from a process of adoption and adaptation, of course, has been accompanied by countless failures and errors behind the success stories.

Through Japan's progressive adaptation and application of systems, methods and
