The Japanese Cabinet released the Development Cooperation Charter in June 2023, which stated, "In its development cooperation, Japan has maintained the spiritof jointly creating things that suit partner countries while respecting ownership, intentions and intrinsic characteristics of the country concerned based on a field-oriented approach through dialogue and collaboration. It has also maintained the approach of building reciprocal relationships with developing countries in which both sides learn from each other and grow and develop together." JICA believes that this 'Knowledge Co-Creation Program' will serve as a foundation of mutual learning process.

I. Concept

Background

The older population worldwide is increasing both in number and as a proportion of the total population. Particularly in low- and middle-income countries, population aging will accelerate rapidly, with projections that by 2050, more than three quarters of people aged 65 and over will reside in these countries (*World Population Prospects 2024*, United Nations). Rapid aging is especially pronounced in Asia and Latin America, but the older population in Africa is expected to triple over the next 3 decades.

Population aging is the result of extended life expectancy, and it should be celebrated. At the same time, it brings multifaceted impacts on society, compounded by shrinking households. To ensure that older people can live with dignity until the end of their lives, society needs to undergo multilayered and multifaceted transformations. This includes strengthening healthcare and long-term care systems, promoting employment in later life, establishing sustainable social protection, investing in technological innovation, and improving accessibility to services and opportunities for older people's social participation.

Japan is one of the most aged societies in the world, with people aged 65 and over making up 29.3% of the total population in 2024 (*Population Estimates*, Statistics Bureau of Japan). It is also marked by the rapid pace of aging over a short period. While it took Western countries 40 to over 110 years for the proportion of older people to increase from 7% to 14%, Japan achieved this in just 24 years. In this sense, Japan serves as a pioneer for low- and middle-income countries that will experience rapid aging soon.

Over the past few decades, Japan has implemented various reforms to address the challenges of an aging population. These include the transformation of health systems to accommodate changes in disease patterns, the establishment of long-term care insurance universally covering care-dependent older adults, the strengthening of collaboration among service providers, the expansion of older adults' employment opportunities, improvements in the sustainability of social protection. The response has continuously evolved, considering societal changes and past experiences and lessons learned. Currently, under the concept of "community-based integrated care," efforts are being made to create age-inclusive communities, with broad involvement from local stakeholders.

This course aims to provide participants with deep, practical knowledge and diverse perspectives on the multifaceted impact of aging on society and the corresponding social transformations, through lectures, site visits, dialogues with experts and practitioners, and discussions among participants. By participating in this course, government officials and members of civil society organizations working on aging society issues are expected to enhance their capacity to envision a desirable future of their societies and communities and develop policies and practices to realize that vision under their own socio-economic,

institutional, and cultural contexts.

For what?

The program aims to strengthen capacity to develop aging society policies/programs and community-based services/supports for older adults.

For whom?

This program is for:

- Officials of central/ local organizations responsible for aging policies and programs such as social welfare or health
- Members of non-governmental/civil society organizations who are working in the community-based services/support for older adults.

For Your Reference

JICA and Capacity Development

Technical cooperation is people-to-people cooperation that supports partner countries in enhancing their comprehensive capacities to address development challenges by their own efforts. Instead of applying Japanese technology per se to partner countries, JICA's technical cooperation provides solutions that best fit their needs by working with people living there. In the process, consideration is given to factors such as their regional characteristics, historical background, and languages. JICA does not limit its technical cooperation to human resources development; it offers multi-tiered assistance that also involves organizational strengthening, policy formulation, and institution building.

Implementation methods of JICA's technical cooperation can be divided into two approaches. One is overseas cooperation by dispatching experts and volunteers in various development sectors to partner countries; the other is domestic cooperation by inviting participants from developing countries to Japan. The latter method is the Knowledge Co-Creation Program, formerly called Training Program, and it is one of the core programs carried out in Japan. By inviting officials from partner countries and with cooperation from domestic partners, the Knowledge Co-Creation Program provides technical knowledge and practical solutions for development issues in participating countries.

The Knowledge Co-Creation Program (Group & Region Focus) has long occupied an important place in JICA operations. About 400 pre-organized courses cover a wide range of professional fields, ranging from education, health, infrastructure, energy, trade and finance, to agriculture, rural development, gender mainstreaming, and environmental protection. A variety of programs is being customized by the different target organizations to address the specific needs, such as policy-making organizations, service provision organizations, as well as research and academic institutions. Some programs are organized to target a certain group of countries with similar developmental challenges.

Japanese Development Experience

Japan, as the first non-Western nation to become a developed country, built itself into a country that is free, peaceful, prosperous, and democratic while preserving its tradition. Japan will serve as one of the best examples for our partner countries to follow in their own development.

From engineering technology to production management methods, most of the know-how that has enabled Japan to become what it is today has emanated from a process of adoption and adaptation, of course, has been accompanied by countless failures and errors behind the success stories.

Through Japan's progressive adaptation and application of systems, methods and technologies from the West in a way that is suited to its own circumstances, Japan has developed a storehouse of knowledge not found elsewhere from unique systems of organization, administration and personnel management to such social systems as the livelihood improvement approach and governmental organization. It is not easy to apply such experiences to other countries where the circumstances differ, but the experiences can provide ideas and clues useful when devising measures to solve problems.
